NEW REPORT ON ASIA'S INFLUENCE ON OIL AND GAS GEOPOLITICS

Washington, D.C. – The National Bureau of Asian Research (NBR) is pleased to release its 2012 Energy Security Report "Oil and Gas for Asia: Geopolitical Implications of Asia's Rising Demand."

Asia's rapid growth is fueling an enormous rise in global oil and gas consumption. Given the continuing anxiety over energy prices and the reliability of future supplies, this report examines how Asia's growing energy consumption is shaping the strategic and economic agendas of the United States and regional powers.

(4) "Asia's Post-Fukushima Market for Liquefied Natural Gas: A Special Focus on Japan" – Tomoko Hosoe, FACTS Global Energy

How Japan's demand shock and the region's shifting sourcing for LNG supplies are reshaping Asian LNG markets

(5) "The Geopolitics of Asia's Rising Oil and Gas Demand: Conclusions and Implications for the United States" – Mikkal E. Herberg, NBR

What the United States, Asia, and other key stakeholders can do to strengthen oil and gas security
